The place where the rivers meet

Nayoro City

Nayoro is located at latitude 44°N and longitude 142°E, to the north of central Hokkaido. Like many place names in Hokkaido, the name "Nayoro" comes from the indigenous Aynu language. Its original Aynu name, "Naioroputo", means "the place where the rivers meet", in reference to the city's location where the Teshio River, the 4th longest river in Japan, meets its tributary, the Nayoro River.

In 1900, 38 settlers from Yamagata Prefecture started cultivating the land and built Yamagata Shrine, which has been passed down through the generations for over 100 years and is still standing to this very day (pic.①).

Originally, the main industries were field crops and timber, but rice later became Nayoro's main crop. Nayoro also developed as a city due to its strategic position on the national railway (pic.②). Chiebun Village (now Chiebun District) became part of Nayoro City in 1954, followed by Furen Town (now Furen District) in 2006.

Kimaroki Steam Locomotive Snow Plow Train The only one of its kind in all of Japan

The name of this train is taken from the first syllable of the Japanese words for "locomotive" (Kikansha), "Molten snow plow" (MAKKURE-sha), "rotary snow plow" (RKTARI-sha), and "locomotive" (Kikansha) again. It is exhibited on the former Nayoro Main Line to this day, and is maintained primarily by volunteers. It is covered up during winter to prevent deterioration, but when there is no snow, you can spot its stately figure, looking like it were just about to leave, from the train window if you are traveling on the Soya Main Line.

Nayoroawa Shizuo

Nayoroawa Shizuo was a famous sumo wrestler from Nayoro who was active from 1932 to 1954. The wrestling career of this inspirational figure was not devoid of struggles. After Nayoroawa reached Ozeki, the second highest rank of sumo wrestling, a sudden illness caused him to be demoted to Maegashira-14, one of the lowest ranks. But, Nayoroawa made a miraculous recovery thanks to his resilience, character and iron will, a feat that infused poster Japan with a new hope and sense of purpose. With "Nayoro" as part of his professional wrestling name, Nayoroawa can be considered to have single-handedly made Nayoro well-known across Japan. You will find statues of him in various sports facilities in Nayoro, as an inspiration to children who play sports.

The museum's calendar is packed with exhibitions, nature walks and lectures that will help you to not only learn about local history and nature, but also experience it firsthand.

Natural bounties brought by Nayoro's unique climate Pride



The largest producer of rice for rice cakes in Japan

Nayoro is famous for producing one third of the rice used for mochi (rice cakes) in Hokkaido and one tenth of that used throughout Japan. 90% of the rice paddies in Nayoro are dedicated to rice for rice cakes, and cover a staggering 3,138 hectares - 568 times the area of the Sapporo Dome stadium (as of 2015).

Hugely acclaimed for its high quality, Nayoro's rice is used in a variety of rice cake products.



Nayoro Rice Cake Ambassador

One of the main events of Nayoro's Harvest Festival is the Rice Pounding Championship, where competitors pound rice to make rice cakes. The winner of this contest is proclaimed the Nayoro Rice Cake Ambassador and takes part in a variety of events to share the secrets of their technique.

Nayoro's official mascot Nayorou

This cute mascot loves mochi (rice cakes) and the stars. He loves rice cakes so much that he wears mochi rice on his head and his body is a stack of two rice cakes. He holds a telescope so that he can look at Nayoro's beautiful starry sky every day.

The best snow in Japan

Due to the intense cold in winter, with temperatures sometimes reaching -30°C, the snow that falls in Nayoro has an even finer texture than powder snow. Known as "silky snow", it is considered the best snow in Japan.



Sun pillars:a natural phenomenon

Typically seen during windless sunrises or sunsets or when the temperature falls below 20°C, sun pillars form when the water vapor in the atmosphere turns into ice crystals (diamond dust). The sunlight reflects off the diamond dust, resulting in a wondrous vertical shaft of light.

Sunflower Fields

Summer in Nayoro is heralded by the blooming of vast profusions of sunflowers, which fill the area like a yellow carpet. You can see a total of 5 million sunflowers in fields around the city that total 50ha in area - 9 times the area of the Sapporo Dome.

A special temporary tourist information center is set up during the 2-3 weeks when the sunflowers are in bloom.

Nayoro City Astronomical Observatory Kita Subaru

Nayoro City Astronomical Observatory Kita Subaru is conveniently located in an area that is just a 15-minute drive from central Nayoro but is also surrounded by unspoiled nature so that artificial light does not interfere with your view of the stars. This allows you to see dark celestial objects that cannot usually be seen, along with well-known constellations such as the Milky Way. The rooftop observatory room has multiple telescopes, including large ones with diameters of 90cm and 40cm.

Pirka Telescope

Hokkaido University's Pirka telescope has a diameter of 1.6m, making it Japan's second largest telescope that is open to the public. *Please be aware that the Pirka telescope is only open to the public on some days.



Planetarium

The planetarium offers four projections each day, with talks by staff members and full-sky footage. These are popular among people of all ages.

The planetarium is also used for a wide range of other purposes, including musical events and lectures.



Exhibition Area

A fascinating range of exhibits including a panel where you can get a sense of how big the sun is, precious artifacts about Rebun Island's solar eclipse from the late Hideo Khara who founded the forerunner of the observatory, and the telescopes that were used at the time of the eclipse. There's also a meteorite area where you can see exhibits of meteorites that have fallen in Japan and various other countries. You can even touch some of the meteorites!






Furen Furusato Festival

Eat

Nayoro's four distinct seasons keep local crops disease- and pest-free, and the large daily variance in temperature produces sweet crops.

Crops grown in these excellent conditions are highly renowned for their high degree of safety, and are a point of pride among Nayoro locals.



Green asparagus•

Nayoro is one of Japan's top producers of asparagus. Its asparagus is hugely popular for its sweet taste, thick stalks and tenderness.

Muskmelon•

Nayoro muskmelons are grown in high-quality fertilized soil watered by melted snow, making them sweet and juicy.



Sweetcorn

Nayoro sweetcorn is extremely sweet (its sugar concentration is over 15%) due to the large daily variance in temperature. Each kernel is firm with soft skin, allowing Nayoro sweetcorn to be eaten raw.



Pumpkin

Nayoro is one of Japan's greatest producers of pumpkin, growing pumpkins with a distinctive firmness and sweetness.



Lily Roots(Yurine)•

Nayoro's lily roots are grown with loving care over a period of three years, producing high quality lily roots with a sweet taste and pleasing texture.



Potatoes

Nayoro's new potatoes are firm with a soft peel and a distinctive sweetness.



Spinach•

Nayoro's Hoshizora Yukimi spinach is grown in freezing fields with snow all around and Nayoro's famous starry sky above. It has a sugar concentration of 13% and an incredible taste.
